

GRADUATE PROGRAM IN EUROPEAN AND MEDITERRANEAN STUDIES

Highly individualized interdisciplinary program in the social sciences and humanities.

Flexible degree requirements allowing students to tailor their studies according to their interests across a range of disciplines, including history, political science, international political economy, cultural studies, anthropology, art history, French, Italian, German, Irish, Central and Eastern Europe, the Mediterranean, and other area studies.

Designed to prepare students for careers in public service/government, non-profit, and cultural organizations, international and regional organizations, international business and law firms, media, and education. Also provides a strong platform for pursuing doctoral studies.

Degree can be completed in 12 months (two semesters and a summer session).

Funding opportunities include generous financial packages for early applicants, summer research/internship fellowships, and travel grants for research or to attend conferences. Graduate student employment also offered.

Deadlines: February 1 (priority deadline for admissions and financial aid) and **May 1** (final deadline for admissions and financial aid, pending availability).
