Assignments:

- Field assignments (3 total; 30%)

These assignments will involve data-gathering and/or hands-on participant-observation, and a writeup. Specific details and directions will be given for each field assignment.

- Reading responses (6 total; 30%) Short (~1p) responses to readings; rather than summarizing readings, these should pose questions, and/or bring in related material or personal experience, that can be brought up in class discussion.

- Final project (30%)

The final project will an extension of one field assignment from the class and will involve an original analysis of data written in a research paper format. Specific details and directions will be given in advance.

- In class participation (10%)

Participation grades will be self-assessed, though can be changed at the discretion of the professor.

Late work:

Late work will be penalized 10% for each day past the due-date. If you anticipate being unable to submit an assignment on time, please discuss it with me so that we can come to an accomodation.
