Professor Jamie Monson Awarded Fellowship

Next year, Professor Monson will be a senior fellow at the Humboldt University in Berlin, participating in a research circle called "ReWork: Work and Human Lifecycle in Global History." While in Berlin, she will be writing her new book, based on the research she has been carrying out in China, Tanzania and Zambia. The title of her project is, "Building a Construction Generation: Labor, Life Cycle and Technology Transfer in a Chinese Development Project in Africa." In the project she is also collaborating with a Chinese historical documentary film-maker, Ru Sheng, who will be developing a documentary film about the project while she writes the book. How cool is that?

During the summer months she will travel to China, Tanzania and Zambia to continue to gather additional research materials for the Berlin project.

So... if you are a junior and you want to take a class with Jamie Monson, next semester would be your chance.

Alum Rose Friedman wins Barbara Wertheimer Prize

The New York State Labor History Association has announced that the 2010 Barbara Wertheimer Prize in Labor History has been awarded to **Rose Friedman** for her essay, "The IWW and the Mesabi Miners, 1916-1917." The Wertheimer committee was very impressed by Ms. Friedman's sophisticated handling of the idea of "race management" and her thoughtful analysis of the divergent forces at work in the IWW and the Mesabi mines. Her research paper was written for Professor Peter Rachleff while a student at Macalester College.

The Barbara Wertheimer Prize recognizes serious study in labor and work history among undergraduate students. The New York Labor History Association awarded the prize to Ms. Friedman for the best research paper written during the 2010-2011 academic year.

Twelve years ago, History alum Ryan Murphy '99 won the same prize for his paper on the deregulation of the trucking industry. A month ago, Ryan successfully defended his PhD dissertation in American Studies at the U of MN. Hooray for History grads!

Grants: Congressional Research Awards 2011

The Dirksen Congressional Center invites applications for grants to fund research on congressional leadership and the U.S. Congress. A total of up to \$35,000 will be available in 2011. Awards range from a few hundred dollars to \$3,500. Stipends will be awarded to individuals (not organizations) on a competitive basis. All proposals must be received no later than March 1, 2011.
