

I read somewhere that 2020 was the longest decade ever.

A little over a year ago, the onset of the pandemic turned the world upside down. We battled against exhaustion to keep up with our responsibilities and to hold our communities amidst great uncertainty, fear, and deafening isolation. We mourned the loss of the promise of spring, the yearly time to celebrate rebirth. Instead, there were many departures without goodbyes, and some of our department colleagues lost family and friends to the virus.

We are less than a month away from the anniversary of Mr. George Floyd's murder. Nine minutes and twenty-nine seconds demanded that we face this nation's racist and violent history. In flames, the Twin Cities took center stage.

On January 6, an unimaginably grotesque spectacle: the insurrection of the Capitol displayed democracy under threat.

Though COVID19, racism, and white supremacy are not in the past, we can see a light at the end of the tunnel. It is true that the tunnel is long, but there is light.

In a leap of faith, the Theater and Dance Department decided to hold outdoor performances. We knew that at any moment the project could collapse: COVID19 numbers could have risen or we could have fallen ill; if the verdict had been different, it's likely that the Twin Cities would be under siege now; and, sometimes it snows in April (or would that be always?).

We decided to gamble and trust our community's resilience because we needed live performance. We need it.

As a space for congregation, the theater invites us to contemplate what it's like to be another human being, and to do so alongside others. The audience sees and listens as an ephemeral community. Although as members of Macalester we have met most at today's performance, we have seldom shared space over the past fourteen months. As we gather at this outdoor theater, we welcome the process of reacquainting ourselves with each other.

I am deeply grateful to the members of the creative teams—faculty, staff, students—and to Professor Paul Overvoorde, co-chair of the Infectious Disease Task Force, for working together to make these performances safe. I am also grateful to the sun, who pushed away the rain and cold that castigated us during tech week.

The word theatron is derived from the ancient Greek verb theaomai, "to see," "to watch in awe and enthusiasm." I wish you nothing less.

The killing of Mr. George Floyd turned the Twin Cities into the epicenter of our nation's struggle to come to terms with its painful history of racial violence. 

Director's Notes

How can we learn to live with loss? How can we connect across great divides and distances? How can we love when we're hurting?

How can't we?

I'm Going to Go Back There Someday is many things. It's a comedy, it's a drama, it's sometimes even something like a tragedy. It's a road trip narrative and a mixed-up myth. There are miracles. There is magic. There is everyday life, the ordinary and the extraordinary. And there are lots of hauntings.

I began writing *I'm Going to Go Back There Someday* in the spring of 2019. I've spent the last several months, first on Zoom, then (hallelujah!) in-person, discovering the play anew as a first-time director.

The question, "How do we stage all this?" is one thing. Asking "How do we stage all this now?" is a whole other beast. Yes, distanced, masked, and outside. But on a deeper level, how do we bring this story involving grief and death to life onstage during a time when we are surrounded by constant reminders of death and are given, it seems, so little time to grieve?

One thing I've learned from working with the incredible cohort who've made this production happen is that the answers to these questions are inherently theatrical. As a team, we collectively realized early in the process that we wanted the audience to see some of our sleights of hand, our brushstrokes and sketch lines. At the same time, this is also a piece rooted in that elusive thing we call truth. Often, the play's "many things"—its worlds—blend. Sometimes, they remain distinct. That's the balance. That's the work and the play of this play.

"There's not a word yet for old friends who've just met," Gonzo sings in "I'm Going to Go Back There Someday," the song (from 1979's *The Muppet Movie*) which lends this play its title. He's right. We still don't have that word. But whatever the word is for my village of collaborators on this project, I'm proud to call them my new old friends.

Thank you for joining us on the road and in the whale. I hope you enjoy the ride.




Director's Notes

Why do so many of us confuse ownership with love? Conquest with consent? Abuse with affection? The consequences of equating these actions are felt most severely by women and by the earth. The work of writing, co-directing, and performing this musical has been guiding by my feminist, environmental and anti-colonial convictions. My hope is that this story will challenge violent conceptions of love and inspire care for ourselves, for girls of color and for the planet.

I wrote the first draft of *Como La Tierra* in Spanish, after travelling around Peru with the SIT Study Abroad Program in the Fall of 2019. There, I conducted field research about the Tia Maria Mining Conflict that my musical is based on. In the Summer of 2020 I completed a Playwrights' Intensive at the National Theatre Institute and developed a 30 minute draft in English that was produced virtually. Now, the THDA department at Macalester is giving me the opportunity to co-direct and stage my musical in-person with the help and support of faculty advisors and student designers and performers. This is an absolute dream come true for me.

I am honored to tell the story of Juana Puyka, a *campesina* from Arequipa, Peru who fights fearlessly to defend her community's valley from the mining company that is soon to exploit and pollute their sacred *Pachamama*. Juana's story holds a mirror to the real stories of the women that lead the fight against Southern Copper Corporation starting in 2007.





Ruth Easton Endowment for Dramatic Arts

The Theater and Dance Department is grateful to the Ruth Easton Endowment for the Dramatic Arts for its support of many Theater and Dance Department activities.

Ruth Edelstein Easton, Macalester Class of 1921, was born and raised in North Branch, Minnesota. After graduation, Ruth studied for a year at Macalester before leaving the Midwest to pursue an acting career in Los Angeles. From there, she moved to New York City, where a friend introduced her to producer Oliver Morosco. Soon after, Ruth was on Broadway, acting with stars such as Clark Gable, Douglas Fairbanks, Ethel Barrymore, Judith Anderson, Walter Huston, and Al Jolson. She was also actively involved in radio dramas, performing in such shows as "The Rudy Valle Hour" and "The Fleischmann's Yeast Hour."

Later inheriting the fortune of her brothers—Dave and Jack Edelstein, who invented a paper-coating process considered the predecessor of plastic wrap—Ruth donated both time and money to acting programs throughout the country. She served as a benefactor for many Twin Cities theaters, including the Ordway, Theatre de la Jeune Lune, and the Playwrights' Center.

When Ruth Edelstein Easton passed away in 1998, the Ruth Easton Endowment Fund was her gift to Macalester. The fund supports cooperation between the Theater and Dance Department and educational sites in the community, as well as bringing guests to campus.
